

DEEDS IN DELAWARE

Letter(s) followed by a Number and a Page

Ancestry

- A-1 (mid 1600s) through Z-50 (~1951)
- In 'Reels' containing multiple Deed groups
- Reel 575 contains Y-50 and Z-50
- Reel 100 contains A-10 through part of C-10

NCC Recorder of Deeds

• A-43 (1941) through Z-82 (1969)

Sequence

- Chronologically, the number is more important
- A-43 is followed by B-43, not A44








BASIC STRUCTURE OF A DEED

- Date of the transaction (indenture)
- Identification of the buyers and sellers (grantee and grantor)
- Sale Price
- Description of the property*
- Reference to the previous sale of the property*
- Assurances and conditions
- Signatures
- Certification by the State

- Repeated in subsequent deeds

FIND THE PREVIOUS DEED

- Usually included in property description:
- "Being the same land sold to to the grantors and recorded in book W, vol 5, page 164"

- Rental properties






TAVERN 1900

AFTER JAMES...

- James Toy owned the property until his death in 1881
- Died Intestate, Property turned over to Orphan's Court
 - Orphans Court M-2 134 (Delaware Public Archives)
- Security Trust and Safe Deposit Company to sell properties for benefit of James' family
- No specific reference to the sale of the tavern properties
- Son John Thomas continued to operate the tavern
- Hundreds of Deeds referencing Security Trust...
- Search for all living members of the Toy Family


DEED JANUARY 1898

- Sale by Orphans Court
- Sold to Mary Toy (nee Elwood), wife of Thomas
- Transcribed as Mary "Soy"

AFTER MARY

- Mary died intestate in January 1901
- Property passed to "Thomas Toy and Children"
- Thomas Died in July 1919
- Property Passed to Toy siblings
- Siblings petition Orphans Court for sale of Property in January 1938
- Purchase by youngest child, Charlotte, recorded in Deed F41-301. Owned until her death in 1975

THOMAS TOY OBITUARY


- July 18, 1919, Sunday Morning Star
- Proprietor of Tavern for 40 years
- Tavern previously known as "Jefferson House"
- Gathering place for Democratic Party
- Noted as place for dancing in 1870s
- Balls held on third floor
- Used for Odd Fellow's meetings



IT'S ALWAYS FAIR WEATHER



On Sundays when the men from Saint Joseph's Church came down after mass, arriving about mid-morning, they would go to the end of the bar known as The Catholic Bar. When the faithful from Greenhill Church—largely Scottish—arrived after service about noon, they would be served from the Protestant Bar at the far end. All would become one great ecumenical mass of humanity as soon as one side would call the other by some imaginative, and not unduly complimentary epithet. Broken pates, glass flying, boots banging on table tops and a babel of Irish, Italian, Scottish and Cursing with a few unintelligible words of English thrown in by the Toys from upstairs were the order of service, concluded by the barkeeper's quiet, polite prayer.

TWO FAMILIES MADE HOMELESS BY HOLIDAY FIRE

Flames Sweep Houses of Dennis Bonner and Bernard De Stafney

ORIGIN UNKNOWN; LOSS PUT AT \$5000

The families of Charles Simpers and James Morgan, each consisting of four persons, were made homeless yesterday afternoon by a fire that destroyed two dwellings and badly damaged the third in a row of three houses at Henry Clay.
